"Doing What is Right in Our Own Eyes: Lessons from the Judges"

- 1. The biggest problem in any culture is not pagans acting like pagans. It is God's people acting like pagans.
 - A. Money is more important than principle. (Judges 1:27-35)
 - B. Men failing to lead spiritually (Judges 4:8-10; 6:11-12)
 - C. Excuses are more common than obedience. (Judges 6:13-16)
 - D. Suspicion and bitterness characterize relationships. (Judges 8:1-2; 9)
 - E. A determination to go one's own way, knowing that it is not God's way (Judges 18:1, 7-10)
 - F. Sexual desire overcomes spiritual desire. (Judges 14:1-3; 16:1-4)
 - G. Bizarre behavior leads to destruction. (Judges 19:20-30; 20:35, 44, 45)

2. Disobedience brings defeat. Revival and salvation become ends in themselves rather than seeking to be worshipers of the true King. (Judges 2:10-19; 21:25)

- 6) Why is the cycle of defeat, repentance, and restoration such a sad cycle? Why is that cycle an easy trap? What can each of us do to avoid that trap? (Judges 2:10-19)
